Course Descriptions: Professional Development Seminars for Academic Physicians and Scientists

Designed specifically for physicians, scientists, and other health care professionals, these seminars provide clear, practical advice on how to communicate effectively in a variety of written and spoken formats, from grant proposals to grand rounds.

Since 1993 Paul Casella has presented over 3,000 of these seminars and workshops to resident and faculty physicians, pharmacists, scientists, nurses, administrators and other scientific and health care professionals at medical centers and meetings across North America and Europe.

The topics can be tailored to the needs of the department or group and can be given in one-hour to multiple-day time frames. Measurable objectives are available for each course to facilitate continuing education credit approval.

Each seminar is entertaining and focused on the needs of the audience. Participants leave the sessions informed and empowered with strategies and skills immediately applicable to their work.

Writing for Publication

162 hours

A clear and reasoned presentation of ideas is critical to the success of a scientific manuscript. This seminar examines the structures and positions of emphasis in the sentence, paragraph, and sections of the formal study to help authors *authorize* their claims. Includes a test of reasoning that authors can apply to the articles they read and the papers they write.

This session will also address how authors can use a systematic approach to the writing process to improve the content and presentation of their ideas in a manuscript for submission. Includes suggestions about how to address the needs of the reviewers, editors and readers of a journal to improve your chances of publication. Can be tailored to emphasize

- Writing Grant Proposals
- A Writing Workshop
- Writing Effective Personal Statements and NIH Biosketches

Speaking for Success: Strategies for Effective Medical and Scientific Presentations

162 hours

This course reviews how adults learn as a means to examine effective delivery techniques to engage scientific and clinical peer audiences. Provides practical information on how to deliver powerful oral and PowerPoint presentations in the classroom, the conference room, the auditorium, and at the regional or national meeting.

Includes a discussion of voice, inflection, body language, techniques to stimulate interest and involvement, and strategies to help facilitate audience recall of the message. Addresses how to prepare for a presentation, how to manage anxiety, and how to design and use visual aids effectively. Can be designed to include elements of

- Brief Research Talks
- Small Group Teaching Skills
- Focused Presentation Skills Training Individually or in Workshops
- Powerful Posters
- Design and Use of Visual Aids

Writing Grant Proposals

1–3 hours

This course reviews the principles of good grantwriting to produce clear, direct, and compelling proposals. Focuses on understanding the psychology of reviewers and the review process, how to engage readers and facilitate understanding, and how to manage the proposal writing process. Suggests proposal templates. Includes exercises related to specific elements of a scientific proposal, particularly the Specific Aims page.

Provides specific direction on how to best organize and format NIH applications for reader accessibility and impact, including information on

- Assessing an institute or grantor's priorities
- Deconstructing RFAs, application instructions, project descriptions, model grant applications
- Emphasizing the significance, innovation, and health-relatedness of your project
- Facilitating reader accessibility
- Taking advantage of the natural positions of emphasis in the sentence and paragraph
- Designing and integrating clear and purposeful tables and figures
- Using subheadings, numbering systems, and figure legends effectively
- *Telling the story* and using other journalistic conventions
- Selling the idea in an objective way in order to establish and maintain scientific integrity
- Networking with colleagues, collaborators, consultants, mentors, and NIH program officers
- Using the reviewer critique criteria as "sentence starters" for the information you need to include
- Writing an effective and integrated Biographical Sketch that will accompany your application

Writing for Publication Workshop

264 hours

This session is dedicated to examining participants' drafts of their manuscripts for publication and suggesting ways to improve the clarity, writing style and structure of the drafts. The group will also apply a test of reasoning to the conclusions. Emphasis will also be given to what the authors did particularly well, in addition to working on areas that can be improved.

Writing Effective Personal Statements and NIH Biosketches

1 hour

A course that reviews writing strategies that engage readers and help emphasize your story in a personal statement or NIH biosketch. Addresses how to frame your background, present, and your vision in a way that is integrated with your work or the project you propose. Identifies ways to stress the importance and significance of your ideas.

Individualized Consultation with an Editor

30-60 minutes each

A private consultation with a science editor. The participant sends a writing sample in advance and then meets with the editor to receive feedback and ways to improve the clarity, structure, and effectiveness of the writing.

Individualized Presentation Skills Training

30660 minutes each

A private consultation with a speaking coach. The participant gives a short presentation that is videorecorded. The coach reviews the video with the speaker and offers suggestions to improve the power of the delivery and the presentation of the content. The speaker and coach repeat this process to refine the delivery and emphasize the main points. The speaker keeps the video, which includes the coach's comments.

Presentation Skills Workshop

263 hours

Limited to 10–15 participants. Each participant gives a brief presentation that is videorecorded and critiqued strengths and ways to improve—by a speaking coach. Includes a discussion of inflection, body language, and use of visual aids; techniques to stimulate audience interest and involvement; and strategies to help facilitate audience recall of the message. Participants keep their own video, which includes the coach's comments.

Effective Interview Skills

1 hour

This seminar addresses effective strategies to use before and during interviews, including preparing talking points, examples, stories, and questions. Stresses how to highlight important information and convey it in a memorable way. Includes a focus on body language, inflection and tone, and the overall image you project.

Powerful Posters

1 hour

This course demonstrates the most effective ways to format and present information in a poster. Stresses the options that authors have to emphasize the visual presentation of their information and ideas. Provides direction on developing headings, formatting text, choosing colors, and adjusting the overall layout so that it engages viewers.

The session also addresses ways to facilitate discussion at the poster session itself and how to prepare and deliver a 1-minute overview of a study or program.

Paul Casella is a writer, teacher, editor and producer. He is a graduate of Dartmouth College and the Iowa Writers' Workshop. Since 1988 Paul has worked with health professionals to improve the clarity and effectiveness of their manuscripts for publication, formal presentations, grant applications, slides, posters, videos, and other media for scientific purposes.

Since 1993 Paul has presented over 3,000 seminars on written and spoken communication skills to physicians, pharmacists, scientists, nurses, administrators and other scientific and health care professionals at medical centers and meetings across North America and Europe. At international meetings Paul coaches speakers on their delivery skills before they present to the society.

A founding member of the Health Care Communications Group, Paul has authored two chapters of their award-winning book *Writing, Speaking, and Communication Skills for Health Professionals* (Yale University Press 2001).

In addition to his work giving presentations, Paul is an adjunct assistant professor and a consultant to the faculty at the University of Iowa Carver College of Medicine, where he leads seminars, edits manuscripts, coaches speakers, and identifies and serves the advanced communication needs of the faculty.
